


Diagram mapping the three stages of course development to the four modules in this course, to associated module activities.

		A content design "storyboard" for one topic in which you indicate how attention will be captured, how content will be segmented, how key principles will be signalled, what types of multimedia will be used and where, and what alternative/ accessible options will be made available to learners.
Deliver and Revise	Module 4: Quality facilitation and improvement	A curated list of Open Educational Resources (OERs) you can use to deliver some (or all) of your course content.
		A welcome announcement capturing your personality and expertise that you can use in an upcoming course.
		A structured synchronous session plan for your course.
		A plan to assess and revise your course.
