



# Understanding the National Occupational Classification (NOC) Tip Sheet

The NOC is Canada’s tool to organize and categorize a breadth of occupations utilizing a five-digit sequence. You can retrieve information about occupational duties, educational requirements, salary range, and other insights by searching job titles or NOC codes through this system. Each digit of the code represents a trait of the occupation based on the training, education, experience and responsibilities (TEER) they require.

In the example below, the occupation for a **post-secondary teaching and research assistant** is organized into the five-digit sequence based on the required level of training, education, experience and responsibilities for this job:

### Skill Type

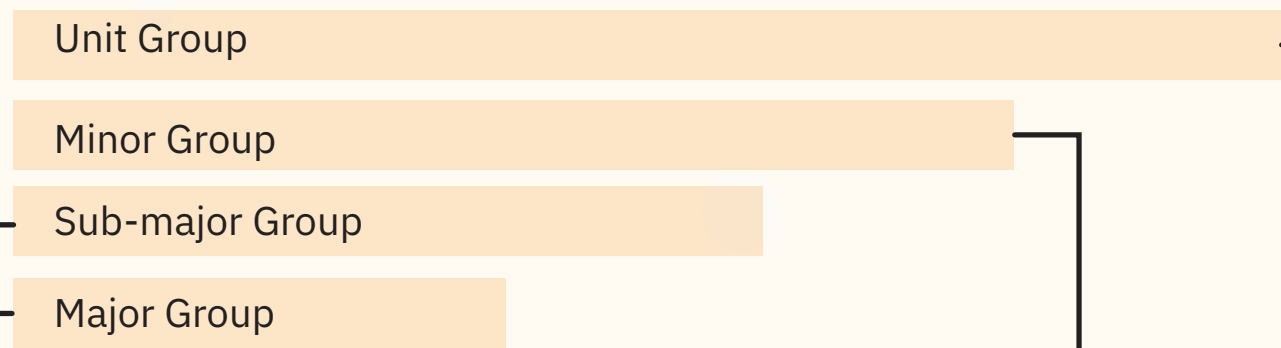
#### (Occupational categories)

- Ranges from 0 to 9
- 0 represents managerial occupations
- 4 represents occupations in education, law and social, community and government services

### Skill Level

#### (Required education/training)

- Ranges from 0 to 5.
- 1 Represents: occupations that typically require university education (Professional occupations in education services).



The **Sub-major Group** in this example is “Professional occupations in education services.”

In this example, the **Major Group** is “Professional occupations in law, education, social, community and government services.”

The **Minor Group** is “University professors and post-secondary assistants.”

The final **Unit** completes the sequence and represents specific job titles within the sector.

**41201 Represents “post-secondary teaching research assistants.”**

### Example:

- 4 - Occupations in education, law and social, community and government services
- 41 - Professional occupations in law, education, social, community and government services
- 412 - Professional occupations in education services
- 4120 - University professors and post-secondary assistants
- 41201 - Post-secondary teaching and research assistants
