

Glide Picking Arpeggios in D Major

Remember that the "glide picking" comes from the wrist and arm as opposed to manipulating the pick with the thumb and first finger. Relax the grip on the pick and allow it to oscillate between the thumb and the index finger. If you occasionally lose your pick, you have the grip just about right.
