## "Prisoner Of Love" (ballad)

These solos were written in 1978. After a few, less than stellar attempts, at a single line solo, Tony Bradan commented that there may be too many notes. With a smile, he suggested that rather than playing "Tico-Tico", I should play "Prisoner of Love." Here is a excerpt from one of my early attempts. This style continued throughout my whole arrangement. The accompaniment was to be in a

"samba" style. (counted in a fast 8/8 feel)

After contemplating the problem for a moment, Tony suggested that I should try to write a solo with less notes and also one that reflected my style. In turn, he would also write a solo and we would compare "notes" during the next lesson. This was the result. (Also worth noting is that neither Tony or I played our solos as squarely as they were written. The straight eighth note passages usually contained some mild syncopation with a blues feel.)





When we reviewed each other's solos, I mentioned that Tony's solo contained very little syncopation across the bar lines. His answer was: "You don't have to incorporate everything you know into every solo that you play. It may be better to present a few ideas and try to develop those into something meaningful." This was an excellent point. Many recordings contain solos which cover the whole map?
