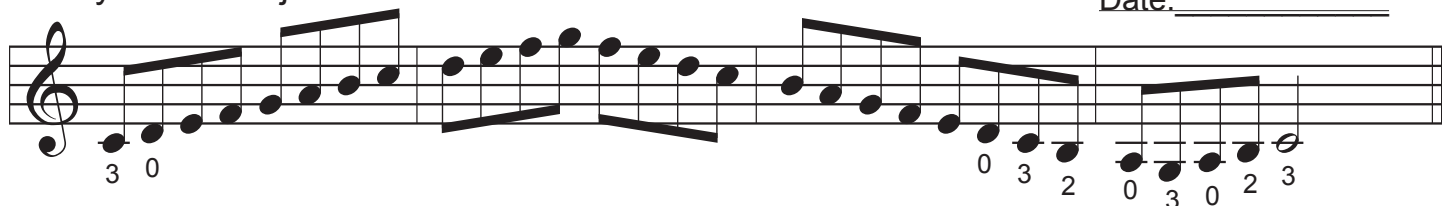


## Major Scales Revisited

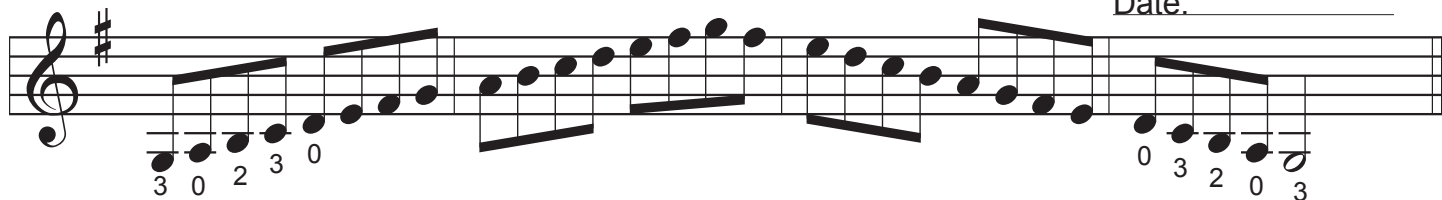
Key of "C" Major

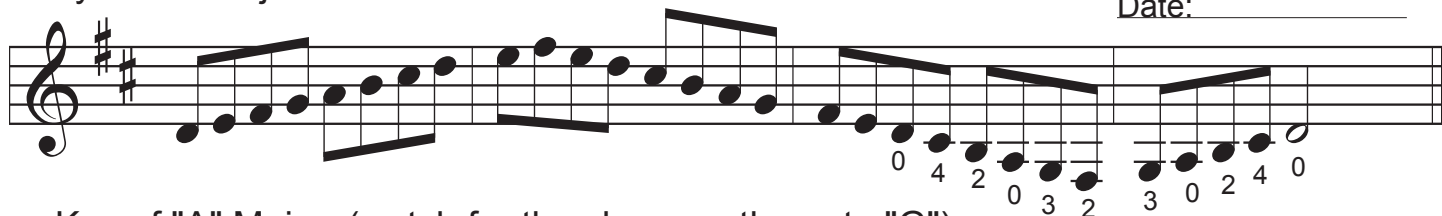
Key of "G" Major (a complete 2 octave scale is available here)

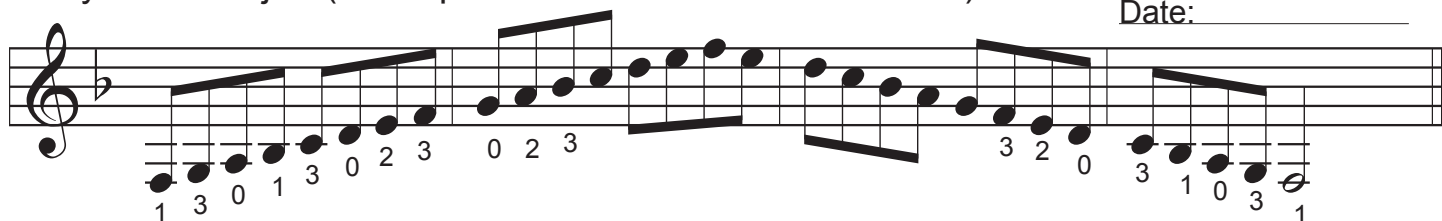
Key of "A" Major (watch for the sharp on the note "G")

Rather than plowing through all five scales in one sitting, it may be better to learn them one at a time until there are no uncertainties. At this moment in time, it is also a good idea to simply accept the fact that being able to play scales well, is very important to your guitar playing technique. In future lessons, you will gain a thorough understanding of the purpose of scales.

All scales have optional fingerings but for now, you should just concentrate on learning how to play them in "open first position." (First Position simply means that the left hand first finger is at the first fret.)
