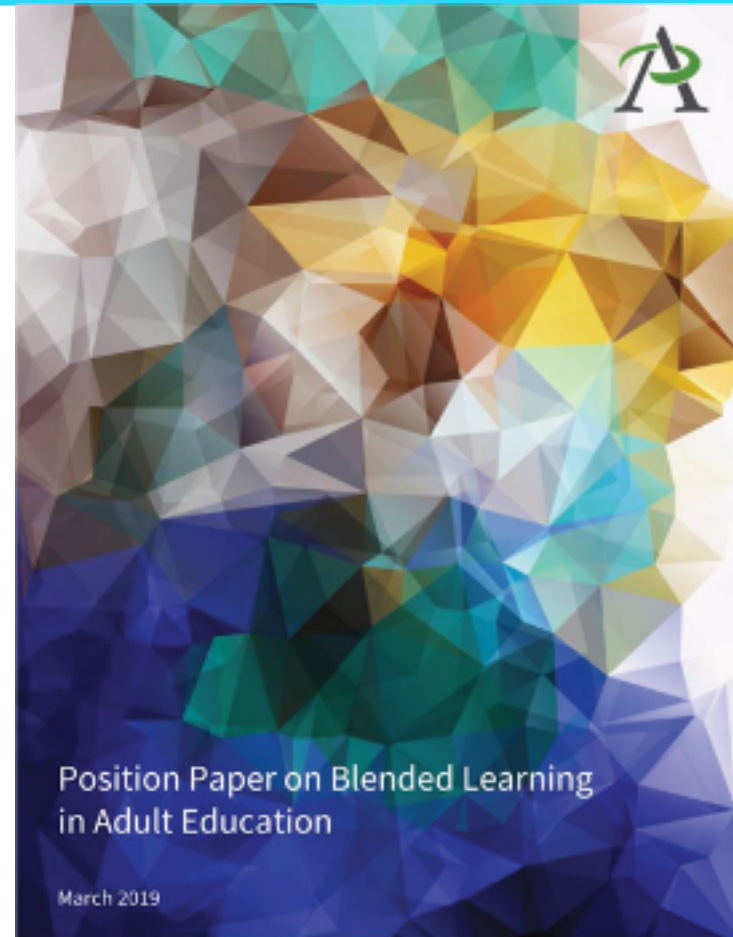
Position Paper on Blended Learning in Adult Education

“Blended Learning (BL) is an approach where educators take advantage of technology and digital access for learners to create, communicate, collaborate and apply critical thinking skills to create meaning in a connected world.”

Taking advantage of technology and digital access...

- BL is **seen as a combination of face-to-face and technology-mediated learning**
- But **it's not** just learning how to use a tablet, navigate the internet or take online courses
- It needs to **suit learner's specific and individualized needs**; be constructed by the **educator with input from the learner**; happen **in and outside the classroom**; help learners **become self-directed in learning**





Constructing knowledge in a connected world...

“Create, communicate, collaborate and apply critical thinking skills to construct knowledge in a connected world.”

Example: Dixon Hall learners using Evernote

- Online tool to share links and resources
- Learners choosing their own learning paths, using it at home/library, suggesting new content, using devices to text with family, making presentations and teaching others

Our students need to be able to “Construct knowledge in a connected world...”

The pressures in integrating technology and BL approach

- Digital tools change rapidly
- Providers need to foster a culture of change and experimentation
- Provide technological and pedagogical training and support
- Encourage PD

= educators more open to change; have freedom to take risks; more confident

Essential principles of BL

1. The program is learner-centred
2. BL activities are relevant and useful
3. The blended program has a strong teaching presence (resources, time, expertise and decision-making)

The Benefits of BL approach

In a high-quality blended learning environment, educators and learners equally benefit from BL approach.

1. Supports learners' self-confidence and self-reliance
2. Encourages social connections and collaboration
3. Provides flexibilities
4. Helps to manage systemic inequalities.





BL Recommendations

BL approach is more than a set of teaching and learning practices - it is a way to think about how to develop adult education programs.

1. There should be more system support for adult educators.
2. Blended learning programs should take a people-first approach.

“By creating a system of support that puts people first, adult education providers will work responsively to ensure educators are equipped with the knowledge and resources they need to create high-quality, collaborative learning experiences where learners develop confidence and competence using technology for learning, for work and in their daily lives.”
