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INTRODUCTION

What is an OER?

Open Educational Resources (aka OER) are resources available digitally, for free, on the web. OER can take many forms, including textbooks.

Your OER textbook is:

- openly accessible (free) and available to all students on the web.
- designed to be accessible using standard web browsers, mobile devices, screen readers and other assistive technology
- available in multiple formats
- printable
- downloadable

How can I Access and Use an OER Textbook?

Even if you decide you will mainly access your textbook through your web browser, we recommend that you download and save a copy of your textbook on your device. This ensures you will have access in the event of internet access outages or website issues.



Using the online web book version of your textbook

The web version of your textbook contains all the same text as the PDF versions. Depending on the book's creators, it may also contain:

- Interactive activities or simulations
- Embedded videos
- Text based review questions or activities
- Clickable footnotes
- Glossary terms (click while reading to see the definition of a word or phrase)



What kind of OER textbook do you have?

Pressbooks OER are easily identifiable by checking the URL for the word "Pressbooks". They also typically have a dark backyard and a landing page that looks like this screenshot (**Source:** <u>Verb Tenses</u> for English for Academic Purposes, CC BY-NC-SA)

Navigating in Pressbooks

The web version of your textbook is built on a platform with:

- a navigation menu labelled "Contents" that:
 - appears to the left hand side of a typical web browser on a computer
 - appears at the top of your screen on a mobile device, labelled "Contents"
 - is accessible to screenreaders
- a search box that will allow you to search the entire book for key terms or sections
 - appears in the top right corner on a typical web browser on a computer
 - ° appears under a waffle menu on the top right corner of your phone/mobile device
- previous & next buttons to allow you to move between pages
 - appear at the bottom of typical web browsers on a computer or tablet and on mobile devices

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

NAVIGATING AND USING THE PDF VERSION OF YOUR TEXTBOOK

Using the PDF version of your textbook

Most OER will have both an online/web book and PDF versions. The PDF versions of your textbook contain all the same text as the web-based versions. They may also contain:

- Text based versions of the interactive activities found in the online web book
- Text based review questions or activities
- Links to embedded videos and external resources
- Footnotes listed at bottom of the PDF page, or the end of the chapter
- Glossary terms (listed at end of PDF file in alphabetical order)

How to get started

- <u>Download Adobe Acrobat Reader</u> for your device (free download) if you do not already have a PDF viewer

TAKING NOTES WHILE READING: DIGITAL OPTIONS

Taking notes while reading your textbooks is strongly recommended. To learn more about note-taking strategies, check out <u>Note-Taking</u> in *Communication Essentials for College*.

Here are some suggestions for digital note-taking. Make sure you investigate to see how to save/backup your notes, so you can be assured your notes are safe and accessible. Suggested software and applications have not been extensively tested in all scenarios. Please take responsibility and consider you own privacy and security before installing any apps or software on your device.

You may need to experiment to determine what works best for you.

Online web book

- Try an extension for <u>Chrome</u>, <u>Firefox</u>, or other browser
- Google Keep, Evernote or Evernote Web Clipper
- Note taking or annotation apps for your mobile device search your app store for note taking or web annotation tools
- Using an OpenStax textbook? Try the OpenStax built in highlighting feature

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- Download and save **specific chapters** before using with Acrobat PDF reader to take notes the full PDF is quite long and the file size could become unmanageable
- Use Pen/Highlighter as you would normally if you've printed your readings

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USING TEXT-TO-SPEECH TOOLS TO LISTEN TO YOUR TEXTBOOK

Most OER do not currently exist in audio book or mp3 format, however, you can use the tools on your mobile device or computer to read the book aloud to you. Many systems have this function built in. You may want to experiment until you find an app or system that works best for you.

- Include a retrieval date, as OER are frequently updated
